Ancient World

Ancient World Summer lectures: Building Rome.

10 May - Building Rome I - I found a city of bricks...

The majority of buildings of Imperial Rome was built of bricks, and the large clay deposits of the Tiber valley offered the raw materials for a brick making industry that supplied the materials. Thanks to the Roman brickstamps we can reconstruct the organization of this industry.

17 May - Building Rome II -....and made it a city of marble

Covering the public brick structures that made up Rome was a large range of coloured 'marbles' imported from all over the empire. A supply monopoly of the Emperor, the use of marble quickly became a status symbol and the control marks allow us to reconstruct the organization of its import to and distribution in Rome.

31 May – Building Rome III – Roman Concrete – the magic ingredient.

Underneath the brick and marble skins, There is the Roman concrete – hard durable and cheap. Roman Concrete and the new construction technique it permitted made a lot of the Roman building styles possible and its widespread use is what allowed many buildings to survive at least in part to this day.

7 June – Building Rome IV – Putting it all together

What do we know of the actual building contractors and architects in Rome? How was their work organized? Where were their workshops? How did they recruit their manpower?

Day-School:

The Ancient Worlds of Greece and Rome in the cinema

Tony Keen

The worlds of Greece and Rome have been central to western education and culture since the Renaissance. It is, therefore, not surprising that antiquity has provided subject matter for the cinema since the movies 5 of 36 began. Some of the most memorable movies that Hollywood has produced are Greek and Roman epics (Ben-Hur, Jason and the Argonauts, Gladiator). And cinema both responds to and shapes the general population's perception of the ancient world.

In this day school, you will be introduced to an overview of the history of Classics and Cinema. We will then focus on three specific areas for more detailed study – the 1950s and 1960s Hollywood epic, British comedy movies using Greece and Rome, and the ancient world movie.

Where do Togas come from? – Rome's Felting and Cloth industry

Ancient Rome's myth of the women providing the cloth needed in the house by spinning and weaving in the *atrium* had by the first century AD become exactly that - a myth. Instead, the textile industry had become a very well organized and lucrative trade that provided income for large parts of the Empire, with 'brand names' or protected 'areas of origin', that seem sometimes modern in its appearance. We will be looking at the evidence of this industry from the 1st-4th century AD.

The Romans like to document themselves in stone – their burials, the achievements in constructions, in politics, in civil engineering, their relationship with the Gods. For this they used a formulaic form of Latin, often abbreviated and usually without the case endings, making it easy to understand, even for those without much Latin. Using inscriptions from Roman Britain the course will introduce you to reading simple Roman inscriptions and to the basic concepts of the Latin language.

After the tomb of Qin Shuang Di the idea of providing the Chinese Emperor with a palace for eternity did not die out. Instead, we find up to the end of the 8th century numerous examples of underground palaces and graves with terracotta armies – although never again at the size of the First Emperor. The graves and the 'armies' demonstrate changes in fashion as well as focus of the Chinese Empire from Warriors to court ladies and musicians to large caravans and herds of horses and camels.

LECTURE: Chasing the riches of the earth – Mining in Angus, Scotland

The Highland boundary fault in Scotland provided potentially a wealth of riches to be exploited in the form of multiple ores. Copper, Lead and Silver being the most common, but also large deposits of iron and rare metals can often be found. In Glenesk in Angus these deposits were exploited for millennia from the Neolithic/early Bronze Age onwards, ending in the 18th century. This lecture will introduce you to the emerging archaeology and history of this area, that is currently being studied by the Roman Gask Project.

Mistresses of the Sky: The Great Goddesses of Ancient Egypt

The great goddesses of ancient Egypt were multifaceted, often appearing in both animal and human form. They fulfilled a variety of functions including guardians of the dead, providers of sustenance, harbourers of rebirth, bringers of plaque, healers and casters of spells. Focusing on the great goddesses of ancient Egypt: Hathor, Sekhmet, Isis and Nut this course will examine how their images change over time and the myths which underpin their manifestations. Two and three-dimensional representations will be examined, including tomb and temple scenes, spell books, amulets and statues.

The course will focus on a discussion of comic verse and argue that "high seriousness" is not the only requirement for poetry and that comic, or light, verse doesn't preclude seriousness or skill and innovation. There is, in fact, a long tradition of comic verse in English and the course will concentrate on a selection of work from Eliot, Graves, and Betjeman; Auden, Empson, and Henry Reed; Stevie Smith and Larkin; and more recent poets such as Wendy Cope, Carol Ann Duffy and Sophie Hannah. Sometimes a joke is just a joke; but it can also be a way of dealing with difficult psychological, moral, social, political and even metaphysical experiences, ideas and issues.

Religion was major issue in the early Stuart Period. James I came from a Presbyterian background but his wife converted to Catholicism. His reign saw the Gunpowder Plot, the publishing of the Authorised Version of the Bible and the sailing of the Pilgrim Fathers.

As for his son, the love of ceremonial, belief in the Divine Right of Kings and a French Catholic wife alienated Charles I from the growing Puritan party in the country. The outcome was the Civil Wars and the period of both political and religious experiment under Cromwell

Enrolment procedures
