ONLINE COURSE Silk Road Studies: Trade along the Tea-Horse-Road

Birgitta Hoffmann

Between the Maritime Silkroad crossing the Bay of Bengal towards China and Japan, and the landroute crossing Central Asia towards Xinjiang and eventually Chang'an, large parts of Asia are tied into a large international Trade system. But what about the landlocked areas of Southeast Asia and Himalayas? This course will look at the Tea Horse Road, famous for bringing Chinese Tea in exchange for Indian Horses in the 18/19th century, but very much older and linking the countries in the Western Himalayas with South East Asia.

ONLINE COURSE The archaeology of Christianity between 400 - 500AD

Birgitta Hoffmann

Christian church architecture at the end of the Western Roman Empire

In part 2 of this survey of the archaeology of early Christianity, we will focus on the differences between churches in the West and East during this period. We see large churches being built in the capitals of the Roman Empire and some of the Eastern metropoles, but in the west church building is caught up in the financial and social upheavals of the End of the Western Empire.

This course is going to look at the evidence in the first large church building period, to give a better comparison to the material that we know from Britain and Germany. It will also discuss how you identify a particular building as belonging to a church and how safe some of these identifications are. (Please note, this is not being taught from a religious perspective, but as an archaeological/ancient historical study focusing on archaeological evidence rather than early church writing).

ONLINE DAYSCHOOL Lapita – The Polynesian World at the Fringes of the Silkroad

In the same way as the land sections of the Silkroad in the Northern steppes are border area that was able to tap into and benefit from the Silkroad itself, thus the Maritime Silkroads in the Pacific were surrounded by people who lived at the margins of this trade routes and were able to benefit from them.

The largest group of these is the Polynesian World stretching from New Zealand/ Aotearoa to Hawaii. The material culture that links these thousands of islands is known as Lapita and its navigational and trading achievements are on a par with other trading nations in the Pacific.

This day school will explore Lapita culture and expansion, and its points of contact with other people in the area.

COURSE Herod the Great

Herod the Great was one of the great survivors of the 1st century BC. His father was chief minister to the Jewish King in Jerusalem, but in the midst of the political and military turmoil between Rome and Parthia Herod secured the support of Mark Anthony and Octavian to become King. When the two former allies fell out he still managed to hold on to power. He was renowned as a great builder of palaces, fortresses, and temples. But in his later years, family tensions became atrocious – he executed one wife and three of his sons. We will explore the life and times of this man – best known now for his alleged part in the massacre of the Innocents of Bethlehem in Matthew's Nativity story

When people talk about the Bay of Naples they now mostly talk about the Southern part, with Pompeii, Stabiae and Capri. However, traditionally the Northern part with Cumae, Misenum, Baiae, Pozzuoli and Naples is the older and economically more important part of the Bay.

This day school will look at the transformation of the bay from the Augustan period onwards with the huge harbour works to handle the Egyptian and North African grain fleet, to the naval base at Misenum and the development of Baiae as one of the largest spa towns in the Roman Empire. But also at the effect of the eruption on the north side and the evidence for reconstruction.

ONLINE COURSE The Conquest of Peru: Incas & Conquistadores

In the 1520's and 1530's the Spanish Conquistadores led by Francisco Pizarro and his brothers encountered and defeated the extensive Inca Empire led by it new ruler Atahualpa. But, unlike in Mexico, the resistance lasted longer as other Inca rulers retreated into the jungle areas. In addition the Spaniards quarrelled ferociously among themselves, and the full story of the middle years of the 16th century will be told. Nevertheless the indigenous people of the Andes are still there on the streets of Cusco and the villages of the mountain region. Using images from a visit there in 2010 the ongoing culture of the area will be explored in order to balance the story of "conquest".

Ovid is possibly the most versatile of the Augustan poets ranging from the lighthearted banter of the Ars Amatoria to the regrets of the Tristia. But the best-known poem is probably the Metamorphoses, a collection of mythological stories that included the transformation of one of the protagonists. The Heroides is a collection of fictitious letters in which Ovid takes the view of the women, who get married, abandoned, replaced or mistreated by the the more famous Greek Heroes like Odysseus or Herakles.

Known since the Middle Ages these stories are some of the earliest stories with females as the lead and are extremely well observed and expressed by Ovid.

We will start this term with the 5th letter: from Oenone to Paris.

Newcomers are always welcome but should ensure that they are familiar with Latin Grammar and vocabulary at roughly A-level or beyond. Feel free to ask to come for a trial session if you are unsure.

COURSE Acts of the Apostles: Chapters 19-28

The final chapters of the Acts of the Apostles concentrate on the life of the Apostle Paul.

They describe his Third Missionary Journey to Asia Minor and Greece and how his hoped for plans to travel west were derailed when he was arrested in the Temple precincts in Jerusalem. He would finally arrive in Rome as a prisoner, but Luke does not describe the outcome of his trial, or his subsequent fate. So what exactly is Luke seeking to do in this part of his work? We will examine closely the details of two chapters per week and probe the literary, historical and theological nature of the work.

For some courses, your tutor/lecturer will establish specific ground rules (e.g. confidentiality, health and safety issues), these form an agreement that all participants need to honour for the course to function effectively.

Should there be a complaint about the way the course is run or a member of the group, the first port of call should be the lecturer/tutor, and only after-wards the Course Director.

However, MANCENT does not act as an employer and the Course Director has thus no formal authority over the individual lecturer. The Course Director (after consultation with other tutors and students) reserves the right to exclude persistent offenders (tutors and students alike) from the network for any of the following : abusive or threatening behaviour, undue disruption to the learning of others, damage or misuse of property belonging to the venue, the lecturer or other students.

Damage, loss and injury

MANCENT or its participating tutors/lecturers cannot be held responsible for any damage, loss or injury sustained by participants inside or outside the venue. This includes theft of (and from) and damage to vehicles, parked near the venue.

Enrolment procedures

Enrolment is continuously, from the point of publication of the brochure on a first come, first served basis. Courses will go ahead, if the minimum numbers are reached.

Enrolment must be accompanied by the booking fee. In cases of late enrolment the fees can be paid on the day of the first lecture, if the maximum number of the course has not been reached.

We accept cash or cheques, but not credit cards. It is not possible to register 'online'.

An enrolment confirmation letter/email will be send to you as soon as possible after receipt of your enrolment. Please bring this to the first meeting of the course. Details of your course venue will be given in this letter or can be found on the Website. In special cases the course will be confirmed by telephone.

Fees and refunds

Class and lecture fees are based on the rate of the rent of room and equipment as well as possible class size and thus vary. Fees are shown against the details of all other activities.

Trial sessions have to be agreed with the lecturer beforehand and are limited to one session per course.

Please note, that due to changes in the law relating to Adult Education provision, we are not able to offer reduced fees to those on a state retirement pension.

If a course has to be cancelled because of low enrolment or for some other operational reason, a full refund will be given to those students, who have enrolled. In this case the students will be informed as soon as possible by the lecturer.

Refunds can be given, if notice is received three weeks before the booked event. After this no refund can be given, unless the space can be filled otherwise. This is because by that point we will have made a financial commitment to book the venue and to run the course with a known number of students.

Other costs

On some courses you may be required to pay additional costs for items such as materials, books etc. Please ask about these, when (or before) you enrol.
